Plan ahead for your reduced rate for the 2006 banquet! Volunteers are urgently needed for several positions.


The board needs a secretary. Responsibilities include attending the monthly meeting, recording the minutes of the meeting and compiling the minutes for publication.

To qualify, one must complete at least one century (a ride of 90 to 149 miles) in every month of the




year. There are provisions for makeup rides for cyclists living in cold climates.



DCC Meeting Highlights

Nov 3, 2004

The Dayton Cycling Club Board of Directors met Wednesday, Nov 3, at CHOICES Inc., 8517 N. Dixie Drive, Butler Twp. In attendance were board members Kay Wert Minardi, Dale Williamson, Claire Lea, Chuck Smith, Kathy Williams, Chris Brown, Barry Schroeder, Anita Patten and Rob Pretzinger. DCC members Michele Rizzardi and Clara Minardi also attended. Directors Dwaine Wheeler and Walter Burton were absent.

The meeting convened at 6:30 p.m.

Kay Wert Minardi moved to approve the minutes of the Oct. 6 meeting. Barry Schroeder seconded the motion, which passed.

The election results were reviewed. Anita Patten and Chuck Smith were re-elected president and vice president, respectively. Michele Rizzardi agreed to be the treasurer, and Kay Wert Minardi will remain as newsletter editor but would prefer to serve as Wright Wride director. Bikeways Director Chris Brown, Webmaster Rob Pretzinger, Calvin's Challenge Representative Barry Schroeder, Huffman Spring Classic Director Dale Williamson and Membership Director Claire Lea all remain in their positions. With the death of Janet Long, the DCC is in need of a secretary.

President Anita Patten reported that Liane Wagner has not completed the new club jersey. Patten is going to request that the jersey be available for spring distribution.

Patten also reported on a promotional trip she took to the southern Alleghenies. She said Pennsylvania is an overlooked riding area with more than 100 miles of bike path, 1,000 miles of off-road riding, and hilly, scenic road riding.

Vice President Chuck Smith reported that he attended the League of American Bicyclists Rally in Indiana. He also attended the opening of the Simon Kenton Trail locally.

Smith proposed that the DCC purchase a bench to be placed along a local bikeway in memory of former Secretary Janet Long. Janet's family had asked that donations in Janet's name be given to the DCC or the Lance Armstrong Foundation. Wert Minardi suggested that the DCC could host a Long Memorial Ride — a short, family-friendly bikeway

ride with multiple food/ice cream stops — with proceeds to be applied toward purchasing several memorial benches. No action was taken, although donations in memory of Janet are welcome.

The remaining \$90 in the Motsch/Hess fund was not disbursed to the Bob Bachtel Memorial Fund as discussed at a previous meeting. Smith volunteered to contact someone from the latter fund.

Outgoing Treasurer Kathy Williams said she would help 2005 Treasurer Michele Rizzardi through the transition.

Williams stated that the current income statement reflected only a \$2,262.79 gain for the year, which was above the projected gain but less than what was predicted based on the success of the individual rides. She said the board must take that into consideration in the upcoming budget process.

Williams added that she would love to see protocols written for event expenses in time for the next cycling season.

Newsletter Editor Kay Wert Minardi stated that DCC members Mark Minardi and Debbie Hirtzinger were preparing to meet to complete the 2003 audit.

Webmaster Rob Pretzinger said he had updated the Web site.

Huffman Spring Classic Director Dale Williamson said he had not received any entries in the Huffman logo design contest. He added that he would work with Heidi Burton to develop one if no entries are received.

Membership Director Claire Lea detailed the current DCC membership as 310 adult members, one junior member, seven honorary members and 344 people in 130 families for 662 total members.

In new business, the DCC's policy for sending flowers was discussed. It was agreed that the current system was working and no formal policy or change would be made.

Meeting times were discussed. It was agreed that the January, February and March business meetings would be moved to the first Tuesday of the month to accommodate schedules.

Smith moved that the meeting adjourn and Wert Minardi seconded. The board approved and the meeting was adjourned at 7:50, to meet again at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 1, at CHOICES Inc.

Williamson, Dwaine Wheeler, Walter Burton, Kay Wert Minardi, Kathy Williams, Barry Schroeder and Claire Lea. DCC members Emily Burton and Clara Minardi also attended. Directors Chuck Smith and Rob Pretzinger were absent.

Dale Williamson moved to approve the minutes of the Sept. 8 meeting. Kay Wert Minardi seconded the motion, which passed.

President Anita Patten reported that graphic designer Liane Wagner, the wife of a DCC member, was still working on the design of the new club jersey. She said Wagner had been apprised of the changes suggested by the board at its September meeting.

Patten presented the final figures for the Maine Adventure of Aught Four (see treasurer's report on Page 5).

She said Randy Brown from Sinclair Community College would be invited to a future board meeting to discuss the idea of his Web design class creating and maintaining the DCC Web site.

Patten said she would ask touring mileage compiler Sally Pinnell to send ride qualifying patches to those who earn them.

Patten announced that the annual DCC banquet would again be at the Crown Plaza Hotel in downtown Dayton. Since Feb. 12 was open, she said she would try to reserve that date.

Treasurer Kathy Williams said the club was showing a good bottom line as it neared the end of its fiscal year. She said the general account stood at about \$34,000.

Williams said she had billed the Tipp City Mum Festival Bike Tour for insurance coverage. She also rolled over a CD in September, taking it down to \$815 to keep it closer to what's in the Jo Glover Memorial Fund.

She said she was still waiting for the final Wright Wride figures in order to reconcile the books for this year.

Membership Director Claire Lea said the DCC's total membership stood at 675, consisting of 319 adults, one junior member, 348 adults and children in 132 families, and seven honorary members.

Bikeways Director Chris Brown told the board the club picnic went well. About 35 people attended.

Huffman Spring Classic Director Dale Williamson said he had not yet received any proposed T-shirt designs for the 2005 ride.

Touring Captain Walter Burton reminded Patten that he needed information about her New Year's Day ride, and asked where he might find information on his responsibilities. He was steered to the DCC Web site, where the bylaws are listed.

Wright Wride Director Dwaine Wheeler presented his final update on the tour's finances (see treasurer's report).

In old business, Williams said the DCC's liability insurance costs have gone up, and the costs of invitationals must be adjusted accordingly.

Patten said some board positions likely will remain vacant since nobody stepped forward to run for office. She is trying to find other avenues to fill these positions. Suggestions are welcome.

In new business:

- •Wert Minardi reported that Mark Minardi, chairman of the Nominating Committee, said 17 ballots had been received. Votes will be accepted until Oct. 15. The votes will be counted Oct. 19 by committee members Minardi, Mike Berarducci and Jim Morgan. Results will be published in the November/December newsletter.
- •Burton said some former members of the Greater Ohio Area Tandem Society (GOATS) met at the Midwest Tandem Rally and talked about resurrecting the group. They are interested in getting various Ohio cycling organizations to list tandem mass starts at their tours in order to help GOATS members and other interested parties more easily meet for rides. The board expressed a willingness to help GOATS in this manner and also discussed other ways the DCC might help. The board discussed the possibility of bringing the GOATS membership under the umbrella of the DCC. No formal action was taken, but a proposal was made to invite GOATS representatives to attend the January business meeting.
- •Lea plugged the Katy Trail in Missouri, which she rode in September. She told the board she was especially impressed with the stops and depots along the trail. She said trail developers/maintainers in the Miami Valley could learn a lot from the Missouri State Parks in this regard.

Wert Minardi moved that the meeting adjourn, and Wheeler seconded. The board approved, and the meeting adjourned at 7:32, to meet again at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 3 at CHOICES Inc.

Time to re-enroll in Dorothy Lane Market's Good Neighbor Program

Because we have just finished making the budget for 2005, I am reminded that one of our asset lines is assigned for our participation in the Dorothy Lane Market Good Neighbor Program. This year our share from DLM will be more than \$100.

In order to continue receiving this "found money," each of us who has participated on behalf of the Dayton Cycling Club needs to enroll anew. The more shoppers who sign up for us, the more money we'll receive next year. One does not have to be a member of the DCC to make us their designated charity.

To participate you must first sign up for a DLM card (similar to the Kroger and CVS cards). Signing up can be done any time at the manager's station at any Dorothy Lane Market store.

Good Neighbor Program enrollment sheets also can be found there. Fill in your DLM number, your name and phone number, and place an X next to Daily Cycling Club (No. 268). Then just drop the form in the nearby box.

For your purchases to be included there is a minimum of \$250 a year. Also, purchases are counted only from the time of sign-up, so we need to enroll now for maximum effect. If you have any questions, feel free to e-mail or call me.

Something new has happened to the DCC's application process. We are now accepting/processing only signed applications. I know, I know, many of you do sign your renewal applications. For you, there will be no difference.

But those of you who have been simply mailing a check or including an unsigned application will notice a change. Your application will be returned to you with a request to sign. If you send no application but just mailed a check, I will send you an application to sign and your check will be held until the signed application is received.

So what gives? The board discussed this topic earlier this year. I felt that signatures for participating at the time of the act itself were sufficient and suggested that we drop the signature portion on our application. Our "mileage" sheets and our ride application sheets contain disclaimers and require signatures.

The discussion that followed resulted in the decision to maintain the signature portion on our application. It was felt that because we are the type of club we are, with a physical activity not without its dangers, we should keep as many signed releases as possible on file. As litigious as society has become, board members felt an obligation to remind members that the decision and responsibility to ride and even to belong is the individual's. At the following meeting, three board members signed their applications submitted unsigned earlier, and I began to apply the same standards to arriving renewals.

While we are discussing the DCC membership application, I would like both adults in a family membership to sign. I also prefer to receive the entire page and not a shortened, cut-out portion of the application page. Think filing. These forms store much easier if they are all the same size.

Last of all, I would like the date of birth. I won't return a renewal for lack thereof, but we do like to have that piece of data.

And while I'm thinking of it, I greatly appreciate those of you who send me changes in your e-mail address, phone number and street address!

Don't overdress for winter bicycle commuting

Here is the conclusion of winter commuting advice from DCC Newsletter Editor Kay Wert Minardi.

I must admit that 5 degrees was really pushing it. But I was experimenting and trying to determine my limits.

For me, the lower limit was about 20 degrees. Below that, the wind chill created by merely rolling along was just too uncomfortable. Bundling up only helped so much, since there was always at least a little bit of my face exposed so I could see. Even with glasses protecting me, my eyes would stream constantly in temperatures below 20. My nose ran almost constantly, too.

My cold-weather "uniform" consisted of a base layer of regular underwear, then a short-sleeved T-shirt and cycling shorts. On top of the shorts I wore fleece tights with nylon wind panels down the front in temps below 45; normal Lycra tights from about 65 down to 45 degrees. In weather below freezing, I would wear a long-sleeved T-shirt instead of the short-sleeved version. I wore my normal cotton socks under my cycling shoes and neoprene booties. Typically, I didn't wear the booties until it was below 45 degrees.

I wore a Coolmax skullcap under my helmet from about 55 to 45 degrees, then switched to my fleece balaclava below 45. On my hands, I wore polypro glove liners under regular cycling gloves from about 55 to 45 degrees; "lobster" or "Vulcan" gloves from 45 down to about 32 degrees; and the polypro liners under the "lobster" or "Vulcan" gloves below freezing.

My top layer on my upper body was a Gore-tex rain jacket. Usually my pit zips were open at least a little bit. I found that even in the coldest weather, I would become very warm and even sweaty by the time I arrived at work. (Thank goodness I had a locker room and shower in the building!)

It took a lot of experimenting before I worked all this out. But basically, I found that if I dressed as if it were about 20 degrees warmer than what the thermometer said, I was comfortable after I went out to the garage and loaded my bike each morning and rode my first half-mile, which was downhill.

A lot of people, particularly non-cyclists, asked me every winter, "Why do you do this?" My answers: I love cycling, I enjoy being outside and experiencing the changes as the seasons progress (although I'm definitely *not* a winter person), I feel healthier and less prone to winter doldrums when I ride every day, I arrive at work raring to go (no caffeine needed), and I don't have to ride my butt back into shape every spring when I commute throughout the winter.

What I rarely told anyone was that I enjoyed the feeling — which the questioners helped emphasize — that I had accomplished something most people don't accomplish or even try to do."

Keep pedaling!

Remember to ride to shopping and appointments as well as work, and then report those miles!



There's no better time to ride the bikeways

Believe it or not, there are some people who are not entirely comfortable riding their bicycles on paths that are shared by in-line skaters, dog walkers and small children. While the need to share the paths with others has been addressed in this space before, the benefits of having a trail all to yourself are also understood. What better time to take advantage of that opportunity than now, in the winter?

Winter riding is great. You're cold for only the first five or 10 minutes, there's always coffee and hot chocolate to be had somewhere along the way, people think you're crazy and you don't have to

rebuild your performance level in the spring.

It doesn't take that much extra clothing, either. A cap or ear covers under your helmet, warm gloves, a pair of tights and a jacket (not too heavy!) should be enough to keep you toasty once you've ridden a couple of miles.

Anecdotal evidence even suggests that narrow tires might perform better in snow than wide knobbies. There's only one way to find out for sure: Get out there and keep riding!

Even if you do it only once, it's great fun and you'll be glad you did. Just be sure to choose a destination that has hot coffee or cocoa!

Columbus Outdoor Pursuits in November released details about the 2005 Great Ohio Bicycle Adventure. The June 18-25 tour will start at the Hancock County Fairgrounds in Findlay. Riders will stay overnight in Tiffin (two nights), Port Clinton (two nights), Elmore and Upper Sandusky in addition to Findlay. Estimated mileage will be a minimum of 240 and a maximum of 400 on flat to rolling terrain. Registration costs \$145 for adults (ages 16 and over), \$80 for children 6 to 15 and free for children 5 and under. The Boca Raton Bicycle Club and Safe Bicycling in Palm Beach County are asking cyclists to visit the "Get Involved" section (http://www.bikeleague.org/involved/ index.html) of the League of American Bicyclists Web site to view a petition asking FDOT to stick to its standards. They feel that failure to maintain these standards would set a bad precedent in Florida and other states. Supporters are asked to sign and circulate the petition, then return it via fax to Jim Smith at (561) 330-6798 or via snail mail to Jim Smith, #202, 1225 S. Ocean Blvd., Delray Beach, Fl 33483.
- •Cycles Gaansari, 1106 Brown St., Dayton, closed on Dec. 23. The shop will reopen in a historic barn at 305 S. Main St., Springboro, in early January. Owner Gary Boulanger said his family is involved in starting a new church in Springboro and feels that "the best way to understand the spiritual and physical needs of any community is to imbed oneself into that community." In addition, he cited the chance to own the shop property and the rural nature of the Springboro area as attractions.

Maine Adventure takes DCC members into Adirondacks, New England

Last Issue: Ten DCC members — nine cyclists and one SAG driver — left Dayton on Aug. 19 for a 1,400-mile trip to Bar Harbor, Maine. In nine days they had ridden through Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and crossed into Canada at Niagara Falls before returning to New York.

The ride from Boonville, N.Y., to Newcomb, N.Y., was one of our most scenic riding days, as we were entering the heart of the Adirondack. The Adirondacks are actually a massive lake with mountain land masses peeking through them and roads connecting the mountains. Blue Mountain was the biggest climb of the day and gave us an idea of what was to come. It is one section of the route I would like to ride again and again. This 90 miles was one of the best riding days we had.

Aunt Polly's B&B in Newcomb, N.Y., was that night's destination. We were warned by Uncle Polly that the Saturday dining crowd at the Newcomb Bar and Grill would be a "bunch of rednecks." We were the only ones in the bar that night. We hadn't had that much sun.

The next day was a shorter day with 75 miles, but again it was a tough day, as we were still in the Adirondacks and had plenty more mountains to climb. The worst road of the 16 days was 7 miles on Route 9 between North Hudson and Severance. The 3-mile downhill into Ticonderoga was a thrill, with most of us hitting speeds of 48 mph or more. I had my first experience of a wind shift racing down a mountain at 45 mph on a bike and actually felt weightless (and terrified) for that half of a second. Ticonderoga was also where we crossed Lake Champlain by ferry into Vermont.

While Vermont started out with fairly flat farmland, we soon moved into the Green Mountains and into Middlebury. It started to rain just as Bob Tackett and I reached the motel.

Greystone Motel in East Middlebury was the site of our second power outage. We were standing outside our rooms watching the storm and saw the lightning hit the transformer across the street. The proprietor brought us tea lights and divided a box of birthday cake candles among us. Bill Sayler and Roger Rizzardi were still out, so we held a candle-light vigil for Roger. We'd given up on Bill.

We left on Monday by beginning the ride with a climb up Breadloaf Mountain, a climb of 1,500 feet in about 9 miles. We followed the White River through the Green Mountains most of the day, with several more significant climbs in the 85 miles. It was for me the hardest day of riding, and I was asleep by 9:10. Roger Brucker that evening visited with his daughter, who lived several blocks off the route.

We thought Tuesday, Aug. 31, was going to be our toughest day. The topographical map showed three significant climbs culminating with a climb over Kancamagus Pass.

We started the day by crossing the Connecticut River into New Hampshire and the White Mountains. A climb to Haverhill was followed by 15 more miles of climbing over Mount Moosilauke. Beaver Pond and a drastic weather change were at the top of that climb. It was windy and cold at the top, and we were Popsicles by the time we finished the 5-mile downhill into Lincoln.

Climbing the 12 miles up to Kancamagus Pass was relatively easy. It was a 7 percent grade, and the weather had warmed up again. Unfortunately, Bob had his fifth flat and blew out both sides of the sidewall on his tire just 3 miles from the top. With no spare tire, he decided to wait for the SAG to come while I finished the ride without him. He missed the final 3 miles to the top for a stunning view of the White Mountains and a 28-mile downhill to North Conway. It was absolutely a great riding day, not at all what we expected!

It's tough to spend almost 55 miles of the day climbing to miss a 25-mile downhill, so I bought tickets for Bob on that night's train ride to Mount Washington. We ate a gourmet meal in the dining

car. It was a romantic evening spent with my husband (and Joan Rudy), and we even danced at the rear of the train as "our song" was playing when we pulled into the station. For his birthday I bought him new industrial-strength tires from the local bike store, which delivered them right to the inn.

Sept. 1 marked the 14th riding day of the 1,400-

mile trip and we crossed into Maine 14 miles into the day. It was another hilly day as we finished traveling through the White Mountains to Lewiston, At mile 1,140, after riding up a 14 percent grade, I finally had to get off my bike and walk the final quarter of a mile. Lynn Brucker later told us that it was well over a 20 percent grade at that point on Waterford Road. Mark Perun was able to climb that hill on his Waterford bike. My average speed for the day? 14 mph.

It was on this day that we realized how "international" our trip had been. We had traveled through Mexico, London, Norway, Paris, Sweden, and Greece and would go through Belfast the next day. We spent the evening at

Davinci's celebrating Bob's birthday with a cake topped with the 14 candles given to us in the power outage in East Middlebury.

After two weeks on the road we were out of the mountains, but the terrain was still very hilly. We spent all day climbing long but not too steep grades. The downhills were equally long. We got our first glimpses of the eastern coastline and spent the night in Rockport after a short ride of 78 miles. We couldn't believe that the next day we would actually be in Bar Harbor. We all went out to dinner that night, where we learned that a 1-pound lobster is 7 years old.

The ride to Bar Harbor was a 92-mile day. In planning the trip, I had envisioned mostly coastline and islands and thought it would be flat. Well, Bar Harbor sits on the other side of two mountains that make up Mount Desert Island. Plus it was a hot, windy day — our first day with any kind of substantial headwind. It was a long day of riding, but the destination became the goal and suddenly we were there! There wasn't a grand welcome like we received in Kitty Hawk, but the thrill of our success was just as great, as this was a tough ride.

When we arrived at the Harborside Hotel, ev-

eryone was sure it was not


We had pedaled 1,400 miles to a mountainside oasis for two full days of rest and relaxation. So we hiked Mount Cadillac the next day and cycled it the following day. Some of us went whale watching and kite flying instead of riding. No rest even for the weary!

The flight home via Detroit was great, as it was a clear day and we followed the Adventure Cycling route all the way through Buffalo, following the actual roads that we had ridden days before.

where we were staying, since it's a resort. It was my best-kept secret. The hotel gave us a deal for a block of rooms that was bayside with a heated pool, hot tub, breakfast, laundry facilities and a weight room. Plus it was downtown on the pier close to shopping, dining and attrac-

The trip was fantastic. There are more stories than I can write about. Ask Jim Lemaster whether he bought his sander and ask about the \$1.47 banana. Jim and Ed Perun both have "pickup" stories. Joan will tell you about the peach shortcake. Ask Roger B, if he'll ever do another cross country ride with fewer than 400 miles under his belt! Bill saw many places we didn't on his 1,800-mile excursion. Michele Rizzardi was marvelous as our SAG driver, but don't ask her husband, Roger, to drive with nine hungry bicyclists in the back of the van. Bob went off a diving board for the first time in his life. Mark and Eddy always got the best rooms. Lynn can tell you the history of every place we visited. Ask Joan where her umbrella is.


